WILLIAM REGINALD ABBATI

Second Lieutenant Essex Regiment • University College • son of the late Mr. Camille Abbati and Mrs. Abbati of Chiswick • posted to Harwich where he contracted bronchitis followed by septic poisoning from which he died on 9th August 1916.

ROBERT BERNARD ABRAHAMS

Second Lieutenant Yorkshire Regiment • son of Mr. and Mrs. L. Abrahams of Dalston • killed in action on the Somme on 13th September 1916 • buried in Central to High Wood, Bazentin Wood and Martinpuich.

GUSTAVE ADLER

Captain South African Departmental Units • London Hospital • son of Mr. H. Adler of Doornfontein, S. Africa • died of pneumonia in West Africa in February 1918.

WALTER GORDON AINSLIE

Second Lieutenant Royal Field Artillery attached Trench Mortar Battery • son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. C. Ainslie of Purley • killed in action by a shell at Hebuterne on 10th November 1916.

RALPH ALDWINCKLE

Second Lieutenant Loyal North Lancashire Regiment • B.Sc., University College and East London College • son of Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Aldwinckle of Highbury • wounded and missing believed killed in action at Beaumont Hamel on 15th November 1916.

PHILIP HAYWARD ALLARD

Captain Royal Field Artillery • Royal College of Science • son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Allard of Bidor, Malay States • killed in action at Zillebeke on 23rd June 1917.

JOSEPH ANDREW-MARSHALL

Lieutenant London Regiment attached Tank Corps • City and Guilds College • son of Mr. and Mrs. G. Andrew-Marshall of Canonbury Park South • killed in action near Cambrai on 20th November 1917 • his tank was leading the way into the second Hindenburg line when a shell hit the tank and killed Lt. Andrew-Marshall with his section commander and the tank N.C.O. • buried beside the tank between the first and second lines of defence.

PERCY HEATH ANDREWS

Lieutenant Royal Engineers • University College • son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Andrews of Wanstead • died on 28th March 1918 of wounds received the same day near Monchy-le-Preux in attempting to carry out a dangerous task when actually surrounded by the enemy • buried at Duisans.

JAMES DUNCAN ARCHIBALD

Lieutenant Essex Regiment & King's College & son of Mr. A. H. Archibald of Highgate & mortally wounded in leading his company in a counterattack against Delville Wood on 20th July 1916 & buried at La Neuville.
