GUY SPEARMAN ARMSTRONG

Second Lieutenant Scots Guards ♦ son of Mr. and Mrs. C. Spearman Armstrong of West Byfleet ♦ reported wounded and missing on 27th September 1915 at Hill 70 near Loos, his body being found a few days later by a search party.

CHARLES VERNON ARNOLD

Flight Lieutenant Royal Naval Air Service ♦ B.Sc., City and Guilds College ♦ son of Captain and Mrs. E. C. Arnold of Forest Hill ♦ killed near Chingford with his pupil as the result of an accident due to engine trouble at a low altitude resulting in side-slip on 16th August 1917.

FREDERICK MARSHALL ARNOLD

Lieutenant Royal Welsh Fusiliers ♦ son of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Arnold of Rhyl ♦ killed in action near Hebuterne on 27th March 1918.

HENRY ERNEST AUST

Lieutenant Yorkshire Regiment attached East Yorkshire Regiment ♦ City and Guilds College ♦ son of Mr. and Mrs. T. Aust of Reading ♦ killed in action in the Battle of Cambrai on 18th September 1918 ♦ buried at Ytres.

CLARE HAVILL AVERY

Captain Essex Regiment attached Trench Mortar Battery ♦ B.Sc., University College ♦ son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Avery of Upminster ♦ wounded by a shell while passing through the village of St. Laurent Blangy and died of wounds two days later 11th April 1917.

JOHN FREDERICK BADDELEY

Second Lieutenant East Kent Regiment ♦ King's College ♦ killed in action on 1st July 1916 ♦ re-buried at Danzig Valley Cemetery.

DONALD FRANK BAILEY

Sub-Lieutenant Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve (Royal Naval Division) ♦ St. Bartholomew's Hospital ♦ son of Mrs. Wenham of Builth Wells ♦ wounded and missing believed killed in the second Battle of Arras on 23rd April 1917.

ARTHUR BRIMFIELD BAKER

Second Lieutenant South Staffordshire Regiment attached Machine Gun Corps ♦ son of Mr. and Mrs. F. Watson Baker of High Barnet ♦ wounded and died of wounds the following day, 26th September 1916 ♦ buried at Dernancourt.

DOUGLAS STANLEY BAKER

Lieutenant Royal Engineers ♦ B.Sc., McGill ; City and Guilds College ♦ son of Mr. and Mrs. George P. Baker of Bexley ♦ wounded by a stray rifle bullet while supervising the digging of a new trench and died of wounds at Puchevillers on 23rd July 1916.

FREDERICK HARBERT BAKER

Lieutenant Machine Gun Corps ♦ South Western Polytechnic ♦ died of wounds on 30th June 1918.

GEORGE WILLIAM BAKER

Captain London Regiment ♦ Birkbeck College ♦ son of the late Mr. Thomas Baker of Bewdley and of Mrs. Clinton ♦ gassed while leading his men at Bourlon Wood and died in hospital at Rouen on 5th December 1917 ♦ buried at St. Sever.
