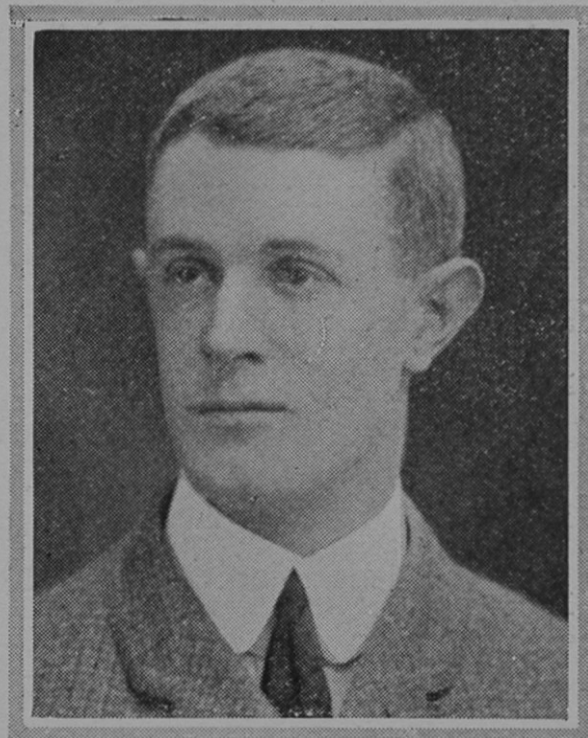


**LIEUTENANT ARTHUR LANGTON
AIRY, 3rd (RESERVE) attd. 1st BATTN.
THE NORTHAMPTONSHIRE REGT.,**

was the only son of the late Dr. Herbert Airy, M.A., M.D., and of Mrs. Airy, of Stoke House, Woodbridge, and a grandson of Sir George Biddell Airy, K.C.B. He was educated at Bradfield College, and first joined the 3rd Battalion of the Northamptonshire Regiment, as 2nd Lieutenant, in April, 1900, and became Lieutenant in the following November. He was attached to the 1st Battalion of his regiment for service in the South



his regiment for service in the South African War, at the conclusion of which he received the Queen's medal and three clasps, and was granted the honorary rank of Lieutenant in the Army. In February, 1903, he retired, but on the Great War breaking out in August, 1914, he offered his services, and on the 11th October, 1914, was granted a commission in the 3rd Battalion of his old regiment, with his former rank of Lieutenant. He was soon afterwards sent to France, where he was attached to the 1st Battalion of his regiment, and after a short experience in the trenches he was killed in action between the 10th and the 11th January, 1915, at Cuinchy, France, after having gone to help a friend who was ill.

Lieutenant Airy married Grace, daughter of the Rev. W. Wood, Rector of Easton, Suffolk, and left two sons.
